Ethical leadership inspires individuals to lead lives of integrity and pursue collaborative work for the common good. This session provides an understanding of the "4V" Model of Ethical Leadership developed by the Center for Ethical Leadership. It also provides tools for exploring ethical dilemmas in real life and for learning to negotiate the tough issues facing leaders in organizations today.

Pat Huges is leadership educator, program designer, journalist, volunteer, and community developer. She serves the Center for Ethical Leadership as the Director of Curriculum Development. She also directs a six-month Citizen Leaders Institute and a three-day conference called the Confluence, which addresses a thorny regional issue. Her work is recognized nationally as she received the National Preceptor Award from the National Association of Community Leadership (one of five national awards) and the Distinguished Leader Award from the Leadership Institute in Redmond, Washington

The Center for Ethical Leadership was founded in 1990 by Dr. Bill Grace, current Director of the Center. Dr. Grace developed the 4-V model of ethical leadership while working in higher education and studying ethical leaders in the Pacific Northwest. When it became increasingly clear that there was a need and demand for ethical leadership training beyond the University community, Dr. Grace founded the Center, a non-profit corporation in the State of Washington.

Leading with Love

Dr. Kathleen Sanford

Leading With Love introduces maternalistic management: leadership based on true concern for the well-being of the organization, the employees, the customers, and the leader. It explains how to balance the needs of all while nurturing your own management development.

Dr. Kathleen Sanford is a hospital vice president, her hands-on working background is complemented by an extensive education in management, including a Master's in Human Resources Management, a Master's in Business Administration, and a Doctorate in Business Administration. Her research focus has been in the area of necessary leadership skills for the future.

Kathleen has been recognized nationally with a variety of honors, one of which was being named The American Businesswoman of 1994. She credits her use of the maternalistic management style outlined in this book with being named The Best Boss in a 1996 newspaper survey.

Cathy Spagnoli, Storyteller

Storyteller Cathy Spagnoli uses slides, stories, props, and material from her many books on Asian storytelling to share Asia today. In this high-interest workshop, Cathy introduces several Asian tellers and storytelling techniques, suggests Asian values/themes to highlight through stories, provides a range of tales and activities for people of all ages, and presents the use of kamishibai and other exciting storytelling props. Asian snacks and many handouts help to enrich the session.

Cathy has told tales professionally for over 20 years and spent much time in Asia collecting stories and meeting hundreds of Asian tellers. Her publications include 13 books, several storytelling tapes, and numerous articles. She and her husband, Indian artist Paramasivam, are now building a second home in Cholamandal Artists' Village, South India. As a professional storyteller/writer she has given storytelling

performances and workshops in the US, Canada, South Asia, Korea, and Japan for over 20 years.

C. Exercising Your Disaster Plans

Julie A. Page, Preservation Librarian for the University of California, San Diego Library

Does your Library have a disaster plan, and does it work? Join Julie A. Page, Preservation Librarian for the University of California—San Diego Library in a day that will begin with an introduction to disaster planning, then focus on disasters and drills. You'll get information about why disaster exercises are important and how to do them in your library, along with an afternoon tabletop exercise where you respond to a disaster, learning firsthand from what worked and what didn't.

Julie is Recovery Director for the UCSD Libraries and has helped to develop disaster training for staff and library collections. She is chair of SILDRN, the San Diego/Imperial County Libraries Disaster Response Network, that was formed in 1995. She has conducted disaster preparedness and response training for California libraries and for numerous professional organizations. Julie was recently selected to participate in the NEH-funded AIC Emergency Response for Cultural Institutions train-the-trainers. In July she will be co-teaching the Western presentation of this workshop in Seattle.
